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A message from your Board...

I would like to start November's column with the really good news that was delivered at our October Board meeting by the Chair of the Landscape Committee, who reported on the common property damage from the worst hurricane to visit Florida in the past 10 years. The total out of pocket damages to Lakeridge Falls is \$7,000. We were very lucky; those Indian burial grounds again.

At our October Board meeting, we were also presented with the proposed 2018 Budget from our Budget committee. By the time you are reading this, we will have had our Budget workshop (October 28th). Following our documents, we must have the budget passed at our November Board meeting so that a mailed copy is in each member's hands by the first of December. The timing is important so that we can have an effective Budget start on January 1st. For those of you on Oded's mailing list, you have already received a copy of the proposed 2018 Budget with his Weekly Report, following the October Board meeting. If you were unable to attend either the Board meeting, or the Workshop, you can still voice concerns or questions via E-mail, or hard copy, to the attention of the Board.

At our board meeting we also empaneled a Nominating committee. This committee consists of three former Board members who will be actively reaching out to our membership, asking that they consider running for our Board of Directors. If you are contacted by a committee member, please consider the possibility of stepping up to this opportunity to serve on our Board. The Nominating committee is there for anyone who has questions or interest in running for one of the three positions on the Board that will be open for election at our annual Board meeting in Feb. 2018. Any member of the Association (must be a titled owner) is eligible to run for a position on the Board.

For anyone unfamiliar with our Vision Project, we introduced that project with a 30 minute video at the September meeting. That video is available on our community website. We also included a Survey form that asks your opinion, and that will be used to gauge movement forward in this project. If you have not filed a survey response to date, please do so immediately if you want your voice heard. It affects you and your property, and is your chance to tell us what you think.

The Vision project, you will recall, was initiated to develop a long range plan to chart out where the community wanted to go over the next decade with the Community Amenities' Center. Recently, the Board has begun to put together two new similar working groups, one to deal with long range landscape planning, and the other to deal with the problems we are beginning to encounter with the long term maintenance of the 16 retention ponds on the property. The Roads and Grounds committee has begun a preliminary survey of our ponds in an attempt to identify areas of both immediate concern, as well as obvious long term erosion issues we face.

It is envisioned that the Long Range Landscape working group will develop a comprehensive plan going forward. The plan is to include every aspect of landscape, from recommendations regarding selection of replacement plant materials, to future design ideas for specific areas of the community, such as our entrance, buffer zones, boulevard and clubhouse surroundings. Starting with a comprehensive top to bottom review and working with community input we intend to explore the possibilities for enhancing the community Landscape asset. Recall that fully half of our annual budget goes to landscape, and associated expenses. We need to explore the possibilities and set a course of action with this effort.

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It is also envisioned that a Ponds' working group will again start with a top to bottom review of where we are, what we did in the past, and what problems we face in the future. Currently, we face serious erosion concerns in at least two of the retention ponds. The starting point will be an emphasis on Erosion, but will hopefully encompass all aspects of the maintenance of our ponds, such as ensuring that their function to remove water is secure, and that the community aesthetic concerns are met. Again, with community input, we wish to develop a long range plan moving forward.

At this time, we anticipate an increased use of our LRF website, to keep our membership informed on issues such as the above.

Finally, we once again remind everyone that we have our annual tribute to our Armed Services Veterans planned for Sunday, November 12th at 2 PM. The Social Committee has their usual interesting program planned, so please plan to get there early and get a good seat.

Application – Relatives/Caregivers – The Board of Directors wish to remind all homeowners to please make sure their relatives and/or caregivers go through the application process once they are planning on becoming permanent residents. As explained by the Board of Directors during its last meeting, there are two main reasons why you are required to follow this formal registration. The first reason has to do with the Association's 55+ status. In order to maintain it, the Association must comply with rules established by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). This

means we must keep an accurate occupancy verification list. This registration verification list allows the Association to prove compliance with the applicable statutes, and maintain its status free from age discrimination lawsuits.

The second reason has to do with the people's background. Requiring all applicants to go through a background check allows the Association to identify individual with backgrounds that may impact the safety of the Community. As we came to learn, this is one of the most efficient tools the Association has to prevent offenders from living here thereby helping to increase the safety of the residents living within the Community.

Therefore, if you have a relative or a caregiver who moved in with you or who is planning on moving in with you, please make sure they go through the application process. We thank you in advance for your cooperation on this matter.

Clubhouse Bathrooms – It appears that at times raising hell pays off. Here is a short recap of the entire bathroom issue. Early August, we discovered signs of mold in the utility closet in the women's bathroom. We therefore called a mold remediation company by the name of The Wright Way Emergency Water Removal. They determined the source of the water causing the mold came from the air conditioning units located in the room adjacent to the bathroom. We therefore called Arctic Air Services, which later on confirmed Wright Way's diagnosis. Arctic Air Services tech then repaired the air conditioning condensation line that caused the problem.

After the water source was eliminated, Wright Way started the water mitigation process. They sealed the men's and women's bathrooms as mold was discovered in both. They then removed all potential contaminated drywall and tile, and started to dry the room using commercial dehumidifiers. Following this, a mold inspection company, which performs air quality assessments (i.e. mold and allergen testing), inspected the bathrooms and later provided a detailed written report, which is called Mold Remediation

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Protocols. The next step was for the Wright Way to provide to the Association's insurance carrier a mold remediation estimate based on this report and also provide a building repair estimate, which they did. Based on the Write Way estimates, the cost for performing these two tasks was close to \$70,000.

To make sense of this number, please consider this. The Mold Remediation Protocols calls for the removal of potential infected drywall and tile. While this does not sound too troublesome, consider this. In order to remove and replace infected drywall in the room, for example, where the air conditioning units are, a general contractor must take apart the air conditioning units, replace the drywall, and reinstall the air conditioning units back. Another issue to consider is the tile in the bathrooms. Once all infected tiles are removed, a general contractor will need to install new ones. The problem is that these tiles are over 15 years old and no longer available. This means we would need to replace ALL tiles on the floor and on the walls in order to match. Not an uncstly job when you take a moment to think about it.

Last month we were informed by the insurance carrier that they approved the entire amount. This meant the Association got the okay to start the repair job! We immediately called the Wright Way and asked them to start the remediation process. Following this, two Wright Way technicians were on site preparing to do just that. When they were done, a mold inspection assessor, a professional technician who performs air quality assessments, was on site. He ensured that the Wright Way followed the mold remediation protocols and completed a few air quality tests.

That means that hopefully by the time you read this edition of the Falls Forum we are cleared to open the bathroom and that a construction company is in the mix of rebuilding the bathroom.



Pressure Wash of Driveways and Sidewalks – During its meetings, the Board of Directors approved a couple of proposals by H2O Cleaning Systems to clean all roofs, sidewalks, driveways, and curbing in the Sandstone Neighborhood. It took H2O over a month to complete these tasks, but when they were done the difference was very noticeable. Because a picture is worth a thousand words, here are a couple of before and after pictures.



Mowing – It is always a little bit difficult knowing exactly when to start the biweekly mowing. After all, temperature, types of grass, ground conditions, and rain are factors one must take into consideration in making such decision. For example, Bahia grass will go dormant and turn brown when temperatures drop while St. Augustine grass may need to be mowed more often under the same conditions. However, a decision needs to be made and ArtisTree made the decision to start the bi-weekly practice starting October. For that reason, ArtisTree did NOT mow the grounds a couple of times this past month. The weekly mowing will resume around March.

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Irrigation over at Victoria – Almost two years ago, we shared how we were experiencing issues with main irrigation lines especially in areas where two or more irrigation lines are connected by a coupling (i.e. the fitting tub that is used to connect between two pipes). The reason for the failure was the bonding agent that held two pipes together. To demonstrate it we use an example of a large leak in a main irrigation line under a resident’s driveway over in Victoria Falls Circle.

Unfortunately, this leak reoccurred a few weeks ago. Therefore, we once again hired Ron LaCivita, Lak-eRidge Falls’ concrete contractor, to remove the section of the driveway where the leak was discovered. Mr. Victor Martinez, ArtisTree Irrigation Technician, with the help of a fellow irrigation tech then discovered the source of the leak. As we came to learn with other main line repairs this year, a crack in a T coupling caused the leak. It seems, at least based on Mr. Victor Martinez account, the former landscape vendor used schedule 40 coupling for its repairs.

In simple terms, a PVC pipe's schedule has to do with the thickness of the pipe: the higher the number (i.e. schedule), the thicker is its walls; the thicker the walls, the stronger the pipe. The problem with schedule 40 couplings, again as we came to learn, is that in most cases where it was used to repair main line leaks it could not take the constant water pressure and therefore cracked. Therefore, Mr. Martinez used and continues to use schedule 80 pipes and couplings, which are slightly more costly than schedule 40 but much more durable and stronger. When Mr. Martinez and his colleague were done with the repair, Mr. LaCivita poured fresh concrete into the exposed area of the driveway. Below are some pictures from the repair.



Fraud Alert – Recently, a resident shared with me his experience in which a scammer attempted to deceive him to purchase a false service. Here is the story:

“Today my computer locked-up with a notice that I had been hacked by a Russian and was to telephone Microsoft for assistance. I could do nothing with computer completely stopped. The notice warned that any action to restart or otherwise use the computer would erase all data and ruin everything. So, I telephoned the number on the screen and talked with someone who convinced me that he wanted to set things right at no cost to me. He sounded very professional, and for the moment I almost believed him. Anyway, he led me through a number of things to do to reset the computer and after a long while all was re-established and the computer was working well again. He then said that he could do no more for me, that he had solved the problem with the computer, but could do nothing to keep me from the hacker. He had a program that could benefit me and, with my permission, go ahead and install a program that would fix the hacking. He quoted a price of \$2700 to do this. I told him that he was out of his mind. He then told me of a senior discount and they would do this for \$1500. I told him that I would not even consider this. His final offer was for \$99.99 and he said that this was a bargain and he had my interest in mind. I hung-up the phone. I later determined that the phone number that he gave me to call Microsoft, 1-855-629-4140, was a computer scam, which I suspected all the while, but he had me doubting my better judgment. I think that everyone should know about this. This is a believable scam and so well done that I was beginning to doubt that it was a scam.”

It is very important that you share these stories with your neighbors and us. This way we can spread the word of a scam that is circulating in our area. Most importantly, together we can make this community safer.

Fitness Center – A couple of weeks ago on Saturday, we received a few reports from residents stating they were unable to enter the Fitness Center. After further investigation, we found that the access control system, i.e. the FOB for the Fitness Center, was down for a couple of hours. We placed a service call with Sunstate Gate, LakeRidge Falls’ gate and access control maintenance company, first thing Monday morning. Sunstate tech, which came later on that day, inspected the system and didn’t discover any issue with it. Unfortunately, the problem re-occurred the following Saturday. Therefore, we once again placed a service call with Sunstate. Again, Sunstate didn’t find any problem with the system. Nevertheless, they updated the program with hopes this will do the trick. And indeed, residents reported that the access control system was working with no issue during the weekend. We wish to use this opportunity and apologize for any inconvenience and thank you for your understanding on this matter.

Pool – Based on a recommendation made by a couple of the Pool Committee members, we switched the pool temperature mode from cooling to heating. Here is a short and simple explanation on what this means. The pool thermostat is set to reach a desirable temperature; in our case, 87 degrees fahrenheit. During the summer time, the pool temperature rises because of sun exposure. Therefore, the cooling mode is set to bring the temperature down to 87 degrees. When it “hits” 87 degrees, the geothermal system that controls the pool’s temperature stops. Therefore when the season changes (i.e. winter) and the temperature outside drops significantly, the water temperature drops as well. As a result, there is a need to switch the mode to heating to bring the temperature up to 87 degrees. Therefore, failure to use the right mode in the right season will result in an unpleasant cold or warm water temperature.

Alligator – A month ago, we reported that a couple of residents spotted a small alligator in the community. We then placed a call with the Nuisance Alligator Hotline, a Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission program designed to protect alligator population while keeping public safety in mind. They then sent a certified and licensed nuisance alligator trapper. The trapper examined the pictures taken by residents and listened to their testimonies. Based on that, it was determined the alligator was about 3 feet long, which complicates things a little bit.

First, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission states that “an alligator may be considered a nuisance if it is at least four feet in length and is believed to pose a threat to people, pets or property.” Why one might ask? Well, the Commission explains that “alligators less than 4 feet in length are not large enough to be dangerous unless handled. They eat fish, frogs and other small animals. Typically, they are not large enough to be a threat even to small pets. The mere presence of a small alligator is not cause for concern.” So by definition, the alligator is not considered a nuisance and therefore is not required to be removed. Another issue is the trap. Small alligators are not big enough to catch on the hook used to catch them. This means the only way to catch a small alligator is to visually locate it and trap it. Obviously doing so requires lots of hours, which trappers are not being compensated for.

Nevertheless, the trapper came at least twice since the initial call attempting unsuccessfully to locate the alligator. He promised to come again when the alligator is spotted. However, he explained it might take a while for him to catch this small alligator for the reason mentioned above.

Please don’t attempt to handle the alligator by yourself if you spot it. Also, please make sure to follow LakeRidge Fall’s guidelines to never feed wildlife and make sure your pets are on a leash and directly attended to whenever outside your home.


Social Committee News

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


