Property Manager's Report

Clubhouse Bathrooms – As reported during the weekly reports, both the men's and women's bathrooms in the Clubhouse are closed. Here is why. Recently, we discovered signs of mold in the utility closet in the women's bathroom. We didn't want to take any chances and therefore called a mold remediation company by the name of The Wright Way Emergency Water Removal.

Following an inspection, they reported that the source is most likely moisture that is coming from the Fire Alarm Control Panel (FACP) room. When the FACP room was inspected, water was present on the floor. Therefore, they speculated the source of the water may be the air conditioning units located in the room or a roof leak. In order to eliminate the source, we immediately placed a service call with a roofing company, Manasota Roofing, and an HVAC company, Arctic Air Services. The roofing company inspected the roof/attic and didn't discover a leak. On the other hand, the



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HVAC tech believed the water came from one of the units' air conditioning condensation line. He took some measures to address it.

Following this, The Wright Way Emergency Water Removal started the remediation process. They sealed the bathrooms, removed all potential contaminated drywall and tile, and started to dry the room using commercial dehumidifiers. At the same time a claim was filed with our insurance company. At the present moment, we are awaiting tests to show the mold has been contained and the rooms are clean. We hope that by the time you read this article repairs are on their way to correct the damages caused by this ordeal. We will continue and share the progress on this matter as things unfold. We thank you in advance for your cooperation and understanding on the matter.

Update - Car Accident Along Tuttle – As you may recall, a few months ago a car had hit a section of the community's concrete wall, broke one of the wall's slabs into fragments, and ended up in the Lake behind the first row of houses on Stirling Falls Circle. As you may also recall, we reported that the Association filed a claim for the damage caused to its property and was reimbursed for the costs associated with repairing the wall and replacing the landscaping around it. It took longer than we hoped for, but finally a few weeks ago Precast Concrete Fencing was on site installing the 20 foot section of wall. Tamas Pataki, LakeRidge Falls' painting contractor, and ArtisTree Landscape, LakeRidge Falls' landscape maintenance company, followed. Mr. Pataki's team painted this section of the wall. ArtisTree Landscape, on the other hand, replaced a few viburnum suspensum plants that were damaged. We are happy to say that this entire unpleasant ordeal is now behind us.

Back Gate – In the past few weeks we have experienced some issues with the back gate off of Lockwood Ridge Blvd. It seems that for some unknown reason the system randomly shut off for periods of an hour or two. For this reason, residents' car clickers

didn't work on the back gate although they did work on the front gate. We of course placed a service call to Sunstate Gate, LakeRidge Falls' gate maintenance company. Over the last two weeks Sunstate Gate replaced, pretty much, the entire electronic system in attempts to solve this problem.

At first, they replaced the receiver. The receiver is an antenna like device that captures the signals that come from clickers and tells the control board to open the gates. When this didn't help, they replaced the control boards. The control boards, as the name suggests, control the gates. They are like a brain directing the gate to open or close based on the signals they get. Unfortunately, this didn't solve the issue either. So, Sunstate Gate replaced the wires, connectors, and transformers. In general, the transformers are the power source of the system. The connectors and wires are what tie all the different components, i.e. receiver, control board, and transformers, together. Not to jinx it, but since this work was completed the issue seems to be resolved. As before, we thank you in advance for your patience and understanding on this matter.

Animal Control – Unfortunately, we continue to receive complaints from residents reporting their fellow neighbors: failure to use a leash while walking their pets, use of too long of a leash, and/or don't pick up after their animals. Manatee County Animal Ordinance 12-10 is very clear. Here are some highlights from it:

- A Manatee County license tag is required annually for dogs and cats, which they are required to wear.
- Dogs and cats are not allowed to run at large.
- Your dog or cat must be on a leash no longer than eight (8) feet in length when the dog or cat is off the property of the owner and must be under the physical control of the owner or custodian.

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- The ordinance requires pet owners to remove feces deposited by their animal from any public property or private property of another.
- If an animal owner is issued a citation, he or she can elect to pay the citation or contest it in court. The person cited is allowed 30 days to make this decision, however, after this time period, if the citation is not paid or contested, they no longer have the right to contest the citation and may end up in jail if the fine is not paid.

To make a long story short, failure to follow these simple guidelines may result in enforcement measures by both the Association and the County. While some may feel this sounds like empty words, in reality there was a case recently that proves differently. A resident of the community reported to Manatee County that his neighbor's dog went after him while riding his bicycle. Sure enough, Manatee County Code Enforcer cited his neighbor and now she is required to pay the citation. We are sure these matters can be addressed without using any enforcement tool because at the end of the day these regulations are set for the best interest of the community as a whole. Therefore, please help us keep this community clean and safe.

Spam Alert – This week, one of the residents advised me that he was targeted by spammers. For those who may wonder, spammers are people who try to email, and sometimes even call, you for the purpose of phishing or spreading malware on your computer. In his case, the resident advised, it was phishing. As explained a year ago, The Federal Trade Commission describes phishing scammers as “people who will impersonate as a business to trick you into giving out your personal information using email, text, or pop-up messages that ask for your personal or financial information.”

The resident who brought this matter to our attention reported that he “...received an email supposedly from eBay but not. It stated that a payment of \$1098.64 was made to PayPal through my credit card on file. I checked my accounts and there were no charges. In fact,

my cards on file were all expired. I don't use PayPal anymore - too many problems. In the email was a link 'Resolution Center' to dispute this notice. **DO NOT OPEN!** My guess is they are trying to get your personal information.”

As suggested before, this type of scam seems like a very sophisticated type of phishing. To better help you understand the type of messages, here are a few the Federal Trade Commission provided as examples of this scam:

- We suspect an unauthorized transaction on your account. To ensure that your account is not compromised, please click the link below and confirm your identity.
- During our regular verification of accounts, we couldn't verify your information. Please click here to update and verify your information.

Our records indicate that your account was overcharged. You must call us within 7 days to receive your refund.

Therefore, make sure **NOT** to click on links sent to you via text messages or emails even if the message seems to be from an organization you trust. If you receive a follow-up call, make sure **NOT** to provide any information and instead end the conversation and call back the institute using the numbers you get from its official website. Remember, a legitimate business will never ask you to send sensitive information through insecure channels.

Here are some more tips provided by The Federal Trade Commission to avoid a phishing attack:

- Use trusted security software and set it to update automatically.
- Don't email personal or financial information. Email is not a secure method of transmitting personal information.

- Only provide personal or financial information through an organization's website if you typed in the web address yourself and you see signals that the site is secure, like a URL that begins https (the "s" stands for secure). Unfortunately, no indicator is foolproof; some phishers have forged security icons.
- Review credit card and bank account statements as soon as you receive them to check for unauthorized charges. If your statement is late by more than a couple of days, call to confirm your billing address and account balances.
- Be cautious about opening attachments and downloading files from emails, regardless of who sent them. These files can contain viruses or other malware that can weaken your computer's security.

We hope you will find this information useful and wish to thank residents who share their experiences to warn others.

Social Security Fraud Scheme – One of LakeRidge Falls' residents shared with me recently an article that was published in USA TODAY. The resident believed, rightly so, that this is an important piece that should be shared with all residents. Please take a moment and read it:

“The Social Security Administration is warning the public to be wary of an employee impersonation scheme. Acting Inspector General of Social Security Gale Stallworth Stone says some citizens are getting calls from persons posing as SSA employees. The fraudsters are attempting to get potential victims to verify their name, date of birth, Social Security number, parents' names, and other personal information, in some cases by telling them that they are due for a 1.7% cost-of-living increase.

Impersonators who get such information can contact the SSA and request changes to the victim's direct deposit account, address, and telephone information. Some of the calls are coming from a phone number with a 323 area code, the SSA says. The Admin-

istration does sometimes contact the public directly for customer service purposes, but this is a rare occurrence, and is usually known to the person who has been contacted.

Best advice: exercise extreme caution before surrendering any private information. ‘You must be very confident that the source is the correct business party, and your information will be secure after you release it,’ Stone said. If you get a suspicious call, contact the Inspector General's office at 1-800-269-0271 or online via <https://oig.ssa.gov/report>.”

Backflows – By now, most of you should have received a letter from Manatee County requiring you to test your backflows within 30 days. If you didn't hear from us, please ignore the letter. Reason why is because the Association contracted with The WaterWorks, a certified and licensed plumbing company, to perform this task for you. As last year, LakeRidge Falls initiated the certification project in advance of Manatee County sending their reminder notices. So by now, we know how many backflows failed the certification process. The Waterworks informed us that 12 backflow preventers, out of 399, did NOT pass the certification process. Therefore, we sent 12 notices to all the owners whose backflows failed. If you are one of those who received a notice, please make sure to correct the matter. Please note that you can use any certified plumbing company for this task. After the matter is fixed, the plumbing company you use should submit the proper certification on your behalf to Manatee County.

Carbon Monoxide and Smoke Detectors – The following is a newsletter sent to us this week from the Southern Manatee Fire & Rescue District. The Administrative Secretary who sent it asked that we share it with our residents. Please take a moment and read this important information regarding this subject matter.

How do you tell the difference between a **Carbon Monoxide (CO) detector** and a **Smoke Alarm**?

Have you ever noticed that a smoke alarm and a CO detector look similar? Have you stood in your favorite home improvement store looking to purchase and replace your smoke alarm only to find you bought a CO alarm? A smoke alarm and a CO alarm may be installed on the ceiling but that is the only thing similar about these alarms.

Carbon Monoxide, also known as CO, is the silent killer. CO is a colorless, odorless, poisonous gas that is undetectable to the human senses. The gas is produced by the incomplete burning of a fossil fuel (gasoline, propane, methane, coal or wood) and improperly used or incorrectly vented fuel burning appliances such as furnaces, stoves, water heaters, generators and fireplaces. If you have any of these appliances or an attached garage in your home, you need a CO detector.

CO Detector:

- The CO alarm pattern is four (4) short beeps followed by 5 seconds of silence and four short beeps. This will not stop until the hazard is eliminated.
- CO Detectors may be operated by batteries or be hardwired with/or without a battery backup.
- CO Detectors are usually marked on the front identifying the alarm as CO Detector or a combo Smoke/CO units. CO detectors should be replaced every 5 years.
- Some brands of CO detectors have Carbon Monoxide written across the top.
- Follow manufactures recommendations on placement of the detector.



Fires produce many gases. The gases displace oxygen within a room. The smoke may contain carbon monoxide, sulfur dioxide, hydrogen cyanide and hydrogen sulfide. In a fire, the thick, black, toxic smoke rises to the ceiling. The temperature can reach over 1000°. Visibility would be zero. Anyone caught in this situation could fall down unconscious in a matter of seconds because of the hot, poisonous smoke. This is why you need a smoke alarm in your home.

Smoke Alarm:



- The alarm pattern is three (3) long beeps, pause, and then three (3) long beeps. This will not stop until the hazard is eliminated.
- Smoke Alarms may be operated by only batteries or be hardwired with/or without a battery backup.
- Smoke Alarms should be replaced every 10 years.
- Follow manufactures recommendations on placement of the smoke alarm.

Test your detectors/alarms monthly. Both are life saving devices that require testing and maintenance. Be sure to read the instructions included with whatever product you choose. This will help ensure your alarm will function as designed when you need it most.




Sociable Stitchers



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
ART LEAGUE


September . . . *Moonglow*

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
