meeting and being willing to be considered as nominees from the floor. The fifth Board of Directors member will be Mrs. Suzi Weinstein who will continue to her second year.

We wish to use this opportunity and say a big thank you to all the Registration Volunteers and elected Inspectors of Elections who assisted greatly in administering the meeting. They were Mr. Jim DuGranrut, Mrs. Betty Curry-Johnson, Mr. Wayne Johnson, Mrs. Jane Kintz, Ms. Mitch Matte, Ms. Cleo Monjoy, Mrs. Barbara Russo, Mrs. Maria Sproul-Cummings, Mrs. Sue Selvidio Stanley, and Mrs. Janice Wright.

Following the Annual Meeting, an organizational meeting took place in which the newly elected Board of Directors chose its officers. Mrs. Suzi Weinstein was elected as LakeRidge Falls' President; Mr. Sims was elected as Vice President; Mrs. Pezzimenti was elected to serve as the new Treasurer; Ms. Parsons was elected to be LakeRidge Falls' new Secretary; and Mr. Danilowitz was chosen to be Director at Large. We are sure all will join us in congratulating the newly elected Board of Directors and wish all a successful and productive year.

As a final note, we would also like to use this opportunity and thank Mr. Stu Sutin and Mr. Rod Hayden for an utterly amazing year/s in office. Not many may be aware of it, but both Mr. Sutin and Mr. Hayden invested endless hours in promoting and executing many important plans and projects, such as the T-Bills, Roof Task Force, and Engage Portal, for the benefits of the Association and its members. And of course, a big thank you to all the other great members of the different committees who finished their terms this year in what proved to be a truly fruitful year. It was a great pleasure working with all of you during this past year and we are sure all members of this Association appreciate the long hours you contributed and the dedication of your service.

Pond #3 – If you may recall, we described in recent months some of the projects that took place in the community which resulted from the Roads & Grounds (R&G) Committee's resourceful research/work. If not, here is a short recap. Almost a year ago, the R&G Committee was tasked with examining maintenance concerns related to pond erosion, sidewalks, streetlights, mailboxes, and recreation amenities. Because this task encompassed vast areas, the R&G Committee decided, with the Board's blessing, of course, to divide the committee into five crews. In general, each crew was tasked with surveying these areas, writing a report regarding its findings, and thereafter presenting a course of action to address such issues. The R&G Committee would then review the work and recommendations and determine what should be the final recommendations to be brought before the Board of Directors.

Back in November, we spoke about the Ponds Crew work. In general, the Crew's task was to survey the Association ponds, identify erosions and other issues that may impact the structural integrity of the ponds, and measure the extent of the erosions along the edges

of the ponds. Once concluded, the Ponds Crew was to issue a report to the Board of Directors which would share the information and data collected, provide possible explanations for erosion causes, and recommend solutions to address issues discovered.

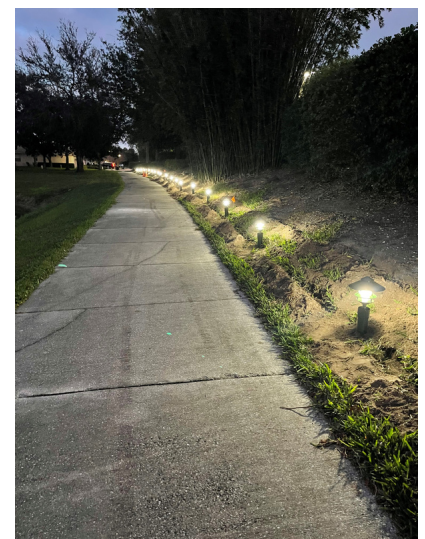
After six months of physically inspecting, measuring, and documenting the ponds, the Crew submitted to the Board of Directors, during its August meeting, an impressive 135-page report of its findings and conclusions. However, the members of the Ponds Crew didn't lounge around. Since August, the Crew has been endlessly working on drafting an action plan for the third test site, i.e., the first is the one implemented at Pond #8, and the second one implemented at Pond #14, this time around, for Pond #3. Once concluded, the plan was presented at length to the Board of Directors.

It took a couple of more months to tweak some of the specifications in the plan, but we are happy to report that during its last meeting, the Board of Directors approved a proposal for repairing the erosion along the south side of Pond #3. We are happier, actually excited, to report that the work took place this week. While there are some minor finishings and adjustments to be made, the impressive outcome of this work can be seen in the before, during, and after pictures to the right.

We hope this test site will prove to be a fruitful experiment helping in drafting a long-term and financially feasible plan to address the issue of bank erosion. This would be a great time to recognize and thank members of the Ponds Crew, Mr. Warren Ferry, Mr. Durand Glovinsky, Mr. Bob James, and Mrs. Betty Curry Johnson, the R&G Committee Chairpersons, Mr. David Danilowitz and Mr. Dick Dorn, as well as the Board of Directors Liaison, Mr. Rod Hayden, for their hard, dedicated, and amazing job.

Street Light Crew – Another one of the crews mention above is Street Light Crew, a task force tasked with surveying the community's street light poles, which are leased from Florida Power & Light (FPL), identify maintenance issues, and provide suggestions for improvements. Among the several suggestions made, the crew proposed installing 28 pagoda lights, similar to the one used throughout the community, along the pathway from Cascade Falls Drive to the Mi Pueblo Gate to provide a safer walking environment and to promote security. As also reported, 28 green pagoda fixtures were purchased, and we were working on scheduling the electrician to install them. It took longer than we hoped for, but we are more than happy to say that the work took place a few weeks ago.

Because a picture is worth a thousand words, the picture to the right, provided to us by Mrs. Sharon Rosenthal, a long-time member of the community, summarizes the result of all the hard work of those who were involved in this project.

With the above in mind, this is just one example out of many we presented in the past and will continue to do so in the future of why committees play a vital role in the operation of the LakeRidge Falls. We wish to take a moment, and we are sure all will join us, to thank Mr. Bill Smith, Mr. Arnold Wallenstein, and Mr. Bob Rouleau, the members of the Street Light Crew, the R&G Committee, and its chairs, and of course the Board of Directors for a truly amazing job.

New Gate Access System – Back in August of last year, we reported that due to a lightning incident, the computer at the gatehouse crashed, which prevented accessibility to electronically stored data. As one can imagine, this had an impact on administration procedures as security officers at the gatehouse had to manually admit vendors and guests as opposed to electronically doing so. While purchasing a new computer is not a major task, shopping for a cloud computing application that allows the Association to store information on a remotely secured server was not an easy task for several reasons.

First, availability. While there are several software programs designed to administrate vendors and guests for a wide variety of businesses, there are not many out there that were developed to address the needs of homeowner associations. Secondly, cost. As one can reasonably assume, a software application for a niche market is something that could not be an inexpensive endeavor. Finally, demand. Because of the limited supply of products, there is a high demand for such software applications.

Of course, the Security Committee and the Board of Directors wasted no time and started looking into alternatives and possible solutions to this matter. Following comprehensive research, the Board of Directors approved back in October of last year a recommendation by the Security Committee to enter an agreement with Applications by Design, Inc. (ABDI), a leading company in this niche industry. We are happy to announce that after a long waiting period, the Association is in the last stages of implementing this new gate access system.

During the first stages of using the ABDI software, the Association will use the same methods it used in the past. That is, security officers will be directed to look up information and log in visitors based on an approved list of guests or a phone call authorization. The exciting news regarding the new software is that it is based on different modules. In other words, the Association can add, and remove, features to the software based on the needs of its members. For example, one of ABDI's more popular modules is GateAccess.net. This allows residents to modify and view their approved guest list and information, which can come with apps for iPhone and Android.

With the above in mind, we kindly ask for the assistance of all residents. Mainly, residents are asked to provide our offices with an updated RESIDENT SECURITY FORM which can be found on page 12. Please make sure to fill this form out and drop it or email it to our offices. The sooner, the better. This way we can ensure we have the most recent and up-to-date information on each resident which will tremendously assist in the seamless administration of vendors and guests.

Thank you so much for your attention and assistance on this important matter.

Engage Portal – In recent weeks, some inquiries have been presented regarding setting up accounts for those who reside at the same address. Here is the issue at hand and how one should address it.

As you know, 399 welcome notice emails were sent to all members of the community. As one may conclude with the 399 figure above, the emails were sent based on addresses. That is, each household was sent one welcome email to one of the emails the Association has on file. Therefore, members who share a household, but wanted to have their own separate accounts were facing technical difficulties in doing so. This is quite understandable considering this is a new system. Like most new systems, it takes time to master. The following example should help, we hope, to make things easier for those who wish to establish a new account.

Let's use a silly example to make things simple. The Wows is a married couple who live on Cascade Falls Drive. The Wows don't share an email address. That is, Mr. Wow has his email address, i.e., JohnWow@Aol.Net, and Mrs. Wow has her own, i.e., JoenneWow@Aol.Net. So, assuming the Wows were legit residents of the Association, the welcome email would have been sent to one of their email addresses. For this exercise, let's assume the email was sent to Mrs. Wow email, i.e., JoenneWow@Aol.Net.

After Mr. Wow came to learn how useful the new portal is, he wanted to set up his own account so he could receive emails, post his artwork on the community feed, and follow the CRC meetings schedule. Here are the steps on how Mr. Wow could establish his own account. For this, Mr. Wow would need Mrs. Wow's help.

- First, the Wows would need to log into Mrs. Wow's established Engage Portal account.
- On the top right corner, they would need to click on the tab "My Account," which is just to the left of the bell icon.
- A new page would be opened. They would have to look for the word "Settings," which appears in blue on the left mid-section of the page, they would have to click on "Household Accounts:"
- This would take them to a new page with a blue rectangle box that says, "Add Household Account," which they would need to click on.
- This will automatically take them to a page in which they can add Mr. Wow's email so he can enjoy all the features of this new portal and once filled out would need to make sure to click on the blue rectangle "Submit".

We hope the above will assist those who wish to establish new accounts on the Engage Portal but are facing some hardship in the process. Of course, members are always welcome to contact this office for assistance. As before, we encourage all members to set up their accounts so they can take advantage of this great service tool.

Smoke Detectors – Recently, one of LakeRidge Falls' residents shared with us that according to the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) smoke detectors must be replaced every 10 years. Acting on a very important point, we urge all residents to inspect, and if needed to replace, their smoke detectors. Below are two important safety tips by NFPA regarding smoke alarms. Please act on this important matter.

Smoke Alarms

Working smoke alarms save lives. However, people who are deaf or hard of hearing may not be able to depend on the traditional smoke alarm to alert them to a fire.



for People who are Deaf or Hard of Hearing

Install smoke alarms in every bedroom. They should also be outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home. For added safety, interconnect all the smoke alarms. If one sounds, they all sound. This gives people more time to escape.

SAFETY TIPS

- Smoke alarms and alert devices are available for people who are deaf or hard of hearing.
- Strobe lights flash when the smoke alarm sounds. The lights warn people of a possible fire.
- When people who are deaf are asleep, a pillow or bed shaker can wake them so they can escape. The shaker is activated by the sound of a smoke alarm.
- When people who are hard of hearing are asleep, an alert device that uses a loud, mixed, low-pitched sound can wake them. They may find a pillow or bed shaker helpful. These devices are triggered by the sound of the smoke alarm.
- Research the products and select the ones that best meet your needs.

WHERE TO FIND EQUIPMENT

Search home improvement store websites or use a general search engine to look for strobe light smoke alarms. BRK/First Alert, Gentex, and Kidde brands offer this type of smoke alarm. Find smoke alarm accessories such as pillow or bed shakers, transmitters, and receivers at lifesafesafety.com, safeawake.com and silentcall.com. Choose devices that have the label of a recognized testing laboratory.

Smoke Alarms at Home

SMOKE ALARMS ARE A KEY PART of a home fire escape plan. When there is a fire, smoke spreads fast. Working smoke alarms give you early warning so you can get outside quickly.



SAFETY TIPS

- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom. They should also be outside each sleeping area and on every level of the home. Install alarms in the basement.
- Large homes may need extra smoke alarms.
- It is best to use interconnected smoke alarms. When one smoke alarm sounds, they all sound.
- Test all smoke alarms at least once a month. Press the test button to be sure the alarm is working.
- Current alarms on the market employ different types of technology including multi-sensing, which could include smoke and carbon monoxide combined.
- Today's smoke alarms will be more technologically advanced to respond to a multitude of fire conditions, yet mitigate false alarms.
- A smoke alarm should be on the ceiling or high on a wall. Keep smoke alarms away from the kitchen to reduce false alarms. They should be at least 10 feet (3 meters) from the stove.
- People who are hard-of-hearing or deaf can use special alarms. These alarms have strobe lights and bed shakers.
- Replace all smoke alarms when they are 10 years old.

FACTS

- A closed door may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.
- Smoke alarms should be installed inside every sleeping room, outside each separate sleeping area, and on every level. Smoke alarms should be connected so when one sounds, they all sound. Most homes do not have this level of protection.
- Roughly 3 out of 5 fire deaths happen in homes with no smoke alarms or no working smoke alarms.
