COMMUNITY MANAGER REPORT - ODED NEEMAN

WATERFALL OPERATING HOURS – Thanks to a report by a long-time member of the community, it was brought to the Association’s attention that newer and tighter water restrictions took effect in April. On March 24 , the Southwest Florida Water Management District (SWFWMD), a state government agency responsible for managing water resources, declared a Modified Phase 3 “Extreme” Water Shortage.

On its website, SWFWMD advised that “[t]he restrictions apply to all of Citrus, DeSoto, Hardee, Hernando, Hillsborough, Manatee, Pasco, Pinellas, Polk, Sarasota... from April 3, 2026, through July 1, 2026.” Furthermore, SWFWMD explained these areas “received below average rainfall during its summer rainy season and currently has a 13.7-inch regional rainfall deficit compared to the average 12-month total. In addition, water levels in the District’s water resources, such as aquifers, rivers and lakes, are continuing to decline and many are severely abnormal. Moreover, public water supplies are extremely low for this time of the year.”

The main impact of the new restrictions on the Association relates to the operation of the waterfall. It is stated that “[a]esthetic fountains are limited to four hours a day. The regular hours of operation can be selected by the owner but must be posted.” Therefore, and to comply with this restriction, the Board of Directors directed the waterfall maintenance company to limit the operation of the waterfall to 9 a.m. until 1 p.m. With this in mind, and because some of the restrictions apply to individual residents, we urge all to take a moment and read about this matter by using the following link:

TOO COLD TO TAKE A SHOWER – Those who used the pool a few weeks back, surely noticed that it took a long time until the hot water at the pool shower came on. Here is the full story and how it was resolved. As one can imagine, the hot water to the pool shower is being supplied by a tank water heater that is located in the Fire Alarm Control Panel (FACP)/Utility Room located at the Annex Building. As can be seen in the pictures below, this electric water heater with the thermal expansion tank mounted on top was demonstrating signs of wear. The green layer on the copper pipe is Patina, similar to the layer on the Statue of Liberty, which forms when moisture, oxygen, and copper are mixed. The significant layer, we were told, indicated that water was leaking down at a very slow rate from the fitting or maybe the copper line itself, i.e., a pinhole. The rusted fitting at the bottom of the copper line going to the water heater, well, does not need much explanation.

Because this condition meant that the tank could fail at any moment, the Board of Directors took immediate action by obtaining two quotes and thereafter selected Professional Plumbing, a well-known and reputable local plumbing company, to replace the tank. And indeed, a couple of their plumbers were on-site to replace the water heater, as can be seen in the after picture. After it was installed, they reported all was in good working order... or so they thought...

During one of the weekends, because after all the weekend is when Murphy from Murphy Law kicks in, reports came in that



the pool shower does not have hot water. Upon further inspection by Professional Plumbing on two different occasions, the pool shower did have hot water, but it took a few minutes before they came out. To some extent, this is similar to the phenomenon one may experience at home in the shower located the farthest from the water heater. Knowing that, it was clear that one of two things may happen: a clogged line or an issue with the circulation pump. Let's start with the latest.

In order to ensure the pool shower instantly receives hot water, a circulation pump was installed. In simple and nonprofessional terms, the pumps push the water down the line faster through the pipe to provide instant hot water to far points, such as the shower in your master bathroom. Therefore, Professional Plumbing suggested replacing the 20-year-old circulation pump. That said, a question must be raised. If the shower had water instead before the water tank was replaced, what happened to the circulation pump all of a sudden? The answer may be that there is a clog somewhere along the line. It is possible that during the replacement of the tank, sediment or other types of debris flew through the line, clogging it somewhere. If this is the case, then hot water "meets" a barrier, which causes this matter.

After further consideration of whether to simply replace the pump or seek a diagnostic to locate a potential clog, a decision was made to replace the pump, which proved to be the right decision. Professional Plumbing successfully completed the task, and thereafter it was said the system is working up to par, and pool users once again could enjoy hot water before and after entering the pool.

PALMS – As you may know, , we recently concluded trimming all the queen palms in the community. However, the purpose article is not to advise what has already happened, but to remind all of the unfortunate future of what will happen. As reported at least half a dozen times in the past, the consensus among professionals and scholars is that due to climate change impacts, the vulnerability of palm species may leave Florida palmless within a few decades. Two of the more well-known diseases are Ganoderma and Lethal Bronzing.

In a document titled "Ganoderma Butt Rot of Palms," Monica L. Elliott and Timothy K. Broschat of the University of Florida describe Ganoderma as a fungus that "degrades the lignin in the lower 4–5 feet of the [palm's] trunk." As they also describe, a "palm cannot be diagnosed with Ganoderma butt rot until the basidiocarp (conk) forms on the trunk, or the internal discoloration of the trunk is observed after the palm is cut down." They conclude by saying there are "currently no cultural or chemical controls for preventing the disease or for curing the disease once the palm is infected." In sum, using simple terms, Ganoderma is a palm disease that can't be prevented or treated and can only be diagnosed after it is too late. The other lethal disease is called Texas Phoenix Palm Decline, or as it has come to be known, Lethal Bronzing. In a similar document published on the University of Florida's website titled "Lethal Bronzing Disease," Brian W. Bahder and Ericka E. Helmick describe it as a type of bacterium that lives "in the part of the plant where sap is transported." Because the bacterium is "transmitted to plants by piercing-sucking insects that feed on the sap," prevention is a challenging task. They conclude by saying that "current data suggests that once palms start showing symptoms, the label rate for the antibiotic oxytetracycline-hydrochloride is not sufficient for symptom reversal." For this reason, the recommendation is that "once a palm shows symptoms and tests positive for the LBD phytoplasma [Lethal Bronzing], it should be removed immediately." Adding to the mix, the average life span of a queen palm is 30 years, which is the age of the palms in the community (i.e., they were around 5 years when installed by the developer), and one can reasonably conclude that this issue significantly impacts LakeRidge Falls. Here is a simple example. In 2023, the Association had 443 queen palms. In 2026, however, this number dropped to 336, which is

almost a loss of 25% of all of the Association queen palms within only three years. Unfortunately, this rapid trends continue, as can be seen in the picture below, as more and more queens are dying.

The good news, however, is that the Association is well prepared to deal with this unfortunate reality. Some may not be aware of the fact that the idea behind the creation of the Long-Term Landscape Group sparked back in 2015 after the Association learned most of its Queen and Chinese Fan palms were infected with Ganoderma. In other words, since 2016, the Association has been continually working to ensure it has an action plan and funds set aside to address this matter by replacing the palms with more disease-resistant palms, hardwood trees such as shady ladies, and a complete landscape bed makeover of beds that were dominated by palms.

Rest assured, we will make every effort to replace all dead queen palms in the community as part of our ongoing commitment to maintaining a healthy and vibrant landscape. With this promise in mind, we wish to thank all for their understanding and patience on this subject matter.



CROTONS AND OTHER DEAD PLANTS – Staying with landscaping matters, more and more service requests are coming from residents requesting to replace one “dead shrub” or another. In the vast majority of cases, the identified plant is one variety or another of a croton. On its website, the UF/IFAS Extension, an educational entity composed of the University of Florida, the USDA, and the various county governments of Florida, advises that corton draws **“...attention with its stunning color and make a bold statement in your house or yard.”**

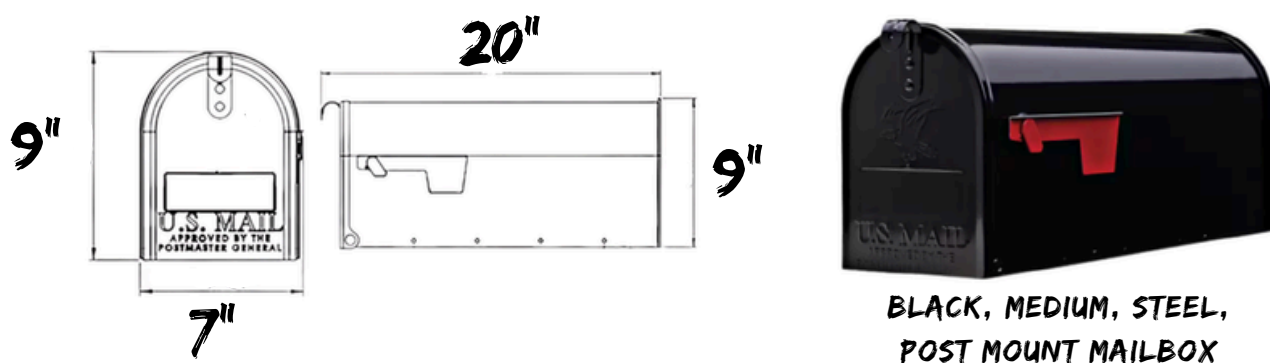
But despite these recent concerns about the health of the croton plants, it is important to recognize that the community’s crotons can be resilient and capable of bouncing back after periods of stress. Crotons may lose all of their leaves, making many believe they are dead or dying. However, with warmer temperatures and consistent watering, these vibrant plants typically begin to produce new growth and restore their colorful foliage.



Residents are encouraged to give crotons time to recover and avoid attempting to remove, trim, and/or fertilize them. With patience and attentive landscaping practices, crotons will once again enhance the beauty of LakeRidge Falls.

PAINTING OF MAILBOXES – As some may know, the Association concluded painting all 399 mailboxes in the community. Here is why. Back in 2013, the Association assumed the responsibility for painting all 399 mailboxes in the community, including the posts and flags. The rationale behind the decision, besides the obvious economic scale reason, is to ensure a harmonized look throughout the community. As with the case of the cleaning of the driveways and the sidewalks, the Association discovered that when homeowners are painting their mailboxes on different schedules, there is a negative impact on the Association's general appeal. In addition, the fact that homeowners are using different products, for example, glossy vs. matte look. And indeed, it is hard to miss the significant impact the work performed by Mr. Tamas Pataki has on the general look of the community.

It is important to note that while the Association is responsible for painting all mailboxes, the ongoing maintenance of the mailboxes, posts, brackets, post numbers, and flags remains the responsibility of individual residents. Homeowners should ensure their mailbox components are kept in good condition. If your mailbox does not close properly or does not have a flag, for example, it is your responsibility to repair or replace the mailbox. Furthermore, if you have an unapproved mailbox, such as plastic, large, etc., you will be required to replace it with the appropriate one, as can be seen in the picture below and measurements below. Therefore, we kindly ask all homeowners to be proactive on this matter. Thank you so much for your attention and assistance in this matter.



UPDATED COMMITTEE STRUCTURE POLICY – During one of its recent meetings, the Board of Directors approved a revised Committee Structure Policy. As you may know, the Board of Directors adopted a few years back a policy that laid out the structure, authority, and responsibility of the Association's committees. Since then, the various Boards of Directors gained valuable knowledge, which led them to the realization that some adjustments needed to be adopted to promote participation, efficiency, and productivity.

Therefore, to ensure there is a quorum during committee meetings, hence ensuring a committee meeting can take place, the Board added the following bulletin to the current policy: ***"Two consecutive absences from duly called committee meetings, without advance notice, will be deemed a resignation from the committee."***

With this in mind, we urge all members and residents to take a moment and read the entire revised policy. A copy of this policy is available on the Association website and on the Association portal. Furthermore, please remember that committees play a vital role in the operation of LakeRidge Falls. It is, therefore, that we encourage all to join one of the Association's committees. Remember, volunteering helps to ensure this community remains one of the best communities to live in both Manatee and Sarasota Counties.

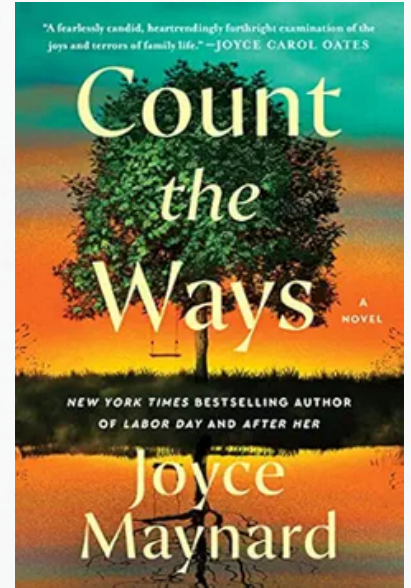

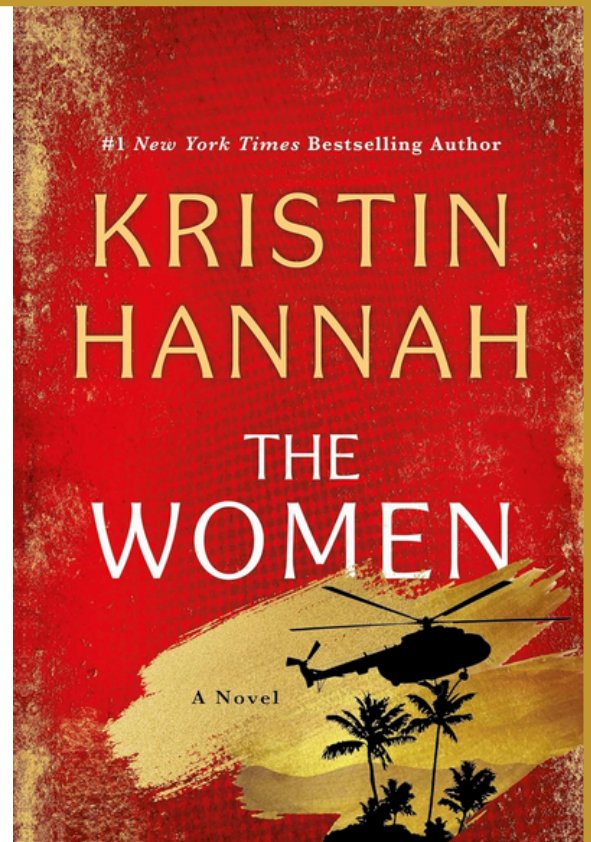

COMMUNITY MANAGER REPORT - CONT'D

BULK COLLECTION PILOT PROGRAM – As you all know, Manatee County launched last year a new program which consolidated all pick-up dates into one day while utilizing a 96-gallon gray garbage bin, which was designed, per Manatee County to “...accommodate increased waste volumes, reduce litter, and support the County waste haulers as they transition to more efficient, automated collection systems.” After the new bin, which is three times the size of an average garbage bin, proved to be problematic due to its size, Manatee County amended the program by exchanging, at no cost, the large 96-gallon bin with a smaller one for those who requested it. With the above in mind, this week, a couple of long-time members of this community shared with us yet another important piece of information regarding this subject matter: a new pilot program Manatee County is launching, starting May 1 . After the new Big Bin Advantage was launched last year, residents who want to dispose of bulk items, which used to be picked up at no charge, had to arrange, for a \$59 fee, of course, for a pickup day with Manatee County Utilities Dept. As a result, complaints from residents led County Officials to reevaluate the subject matter. On its website, Manatee County advised on April 8th, 2026, that:

“The Manatee County Board of County Commissioners has approved the launch of a Bulk Collection Pilot Program by Manatee County Utilities beginning May 1, 2026, expanding curbside bulk pickup service for residents while collecting data to help evaluate future service options. Under the pilot program, residential customers will be able to have two bulk items picked up at the curb on a predetermined scheduled regular service day once per month, for a total of 12 collections per year, with no rate changes at this time. The program will also include one annual bulk collection per property (of up to 10 cubic yards) of the same material... Certain items, including tires and white goods (appliances), as well as the annual large-bulk pickup, will require advance scheduling through the County’s Customer Self-Service Portal at mymanatee.org/css. Household hazardous waste and electronic scrap services will not change as part of the pilot program and will continue to not be collected curbside. Manatee County residents may continue to drop off these materials free of charge at the Lena Road Landfill, and the County will continue offering four remote household hazardous waste dropoff events each year. More information is available at mymanatee.org/hhw.”

We hope you find this information helpful and thank all residents who share such information with the rest of the community.

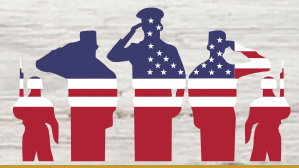
